Many of the world's roughly 260,000 species of flowering plants are dependant on pollinators to survive. A pollinator is any insect, bird or animal that carries pollen from one flower to another to accomplish fertilization and the production of seed. Most pollinators, like the Banded Peacock Butterfly shown on the front of this Visible Verse™ card, are seeking the flower's nectar as a sugar-rich, liquid food source. Although nectar is what the butterfly is after, it is often the flower's fragrance that leads it there.

Just as a flower's beautiful fragrance attracts butterflies, the fragrance of our lives should attract and encourages others to follow Christ. What "fragrance" do people "smell" when they see our lives in the community, at work, at home or in the church? Do we leave behind the sweet fragrance of Christ wherever we go? The aroma of Christ is left behind in many ways: an offer of forgiveness, selfless assistance to a neighbor, or lovingly embracing a grieving family member. Although the fragrance of Christ comes in many forms, its source is singular: a heart totally surrendered to the Lordship of Jesus Christ.
